SYRACUSE SUFFRAGE MARCH

2,000 Women and 500 Men Parade -Mass Meeting Draws 5,000.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 28.—A suffrage demonstration, in which 2,000 wo-men and 500 men, headed by Mayor Louis Will, took part, was held in this city today, followed by a mass meeting of 5,000 at the State Armory.

The procession, brilliant with flaming banners and enlivened by many bands and drum corps, was watched by thousands of people, who applauded it along the line of march.

Practically the entire section of Central New York was represented, and many prominent women from New York City and from the West were in line. Every village in Onondaga County sent a delegation of women, uniformed in white and bearing yellow banners in-scribed with the numbers of their dis-

tricts.

At the State Armory speeches were made by Miss Helen Todd of California. Mayor Will, Miss Caroline Lexow, and Miss Rose Winslow. Others on the speakers' platform were Mrs. Norman De R. Whitehouse of New York City and Mrs. Harriot Stanton Blatch, President of the Woman's Political Union.
